
Nature Etching

OVERVIEW:

In this activity, youth etch natural surfaces (leaves, rocks, twigs, pine cones, etc.) on paper and foil. Each participant took home their etchings & rubbings.

MATERIALS:

- Rubbing Booklet
- Pencils, Crayons, or Pencil Crayons
- Natural Surfaces (Leaves, twigs, rocks, pine cones...)
- Foil
- Tape

PROCEDURE

Paper Rubbings

- Step 1. Show children a sample poster of pencil rubbings, and provide brief instruction on how to achieve clear rubbings using pencil (crayon or pencil crayon also work well), paper, and a textured surface.
- Step 2. Give each child paper and pencil. 3. Take children on a small hike around the area. Be sure to point out local species of plants and animals along the way (bring along a field guide to help with identifications; invite older students to make identifications themselves).
- Step 4. Have children record the many interesting patterns and textures they find in nature through pencil rubbings.
- Step 5. Children can use multiple textures and colors on one piece of paper to add to the creativity of their work.

Foil Rubbings

- Step 1: Once all children are through with their hike and pencil rubbings, encourage them to try foil rubbings.
- Step 2: Have children find a textured object.
- Step 3: Tape foil over object.
- Step 4. Show children how to gently rub textures into the foil using a pencil or stick. Try to capture all of the unique textures found on the leaf, rock, etc.
